Fairseat News – 12th March 2020

- **Coronavirus (COVID-19)** the item that dominates the news and correctly so. The information coming out of China suggests that some people are at a higher risk of getting VERY sick. These people tend to be:
 - Older adults (over 65 years old)
 - o People who have serious chronic medical conditions
 - Heart disease
 - Diabetes
 - Lung disease

As a result, for Fairseat, COVID-19 represents a real and significant threat. We are informed by the Kenyan Government that, at the time of typing, Kenya has not recorded a coronavirus case yet but I think the chance of maintaining this record is very slim. We need to plan for the worst and hope for the best. Understanding the dangers of coronavirus and how the disease is transmitted is important to minimizing its impact. Essentially there are two ways that COVID-19 spreads:

- Mainly through person-to-person spread this is between people in close contact with each other normally less that 2 metres or 6 feet. It is spread through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes and these droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or be inhaled into their lungs.
- Through a person touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose or their eyes.

It appears that COVID-19 spreads easily and sustainably through the community. Symptoms range from mild to severe illness and death. Based on previous CoV viruses, it is thought that the symptoms may appear 2-14 days after exposure. These symptoms include:

- Fever
- Cough
- Shortness of breath

How to protect yourself

- clean your hands often
 - Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds especially after you have been in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing.
 - o If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.
 - Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoid close contact
 - Avoid close contact with people who are sick
 - Put distance between yourself and other people if COVID-19 is spreading in your community.
 This is important for people who are at higher risk of getting very sick.

With all this in mind, Fairseat will continue to monitor the situation and prepare. We may have to take more drastic measures if the situation in Kenya takes a turn for the worse. It is most important that visitors and staff are aware of the importance of not putting our residents at risk unnecessarily.

All residences will be issued with a hand sanitizer and our public areas will have dispensers installed to facilitate regular and thorough hand cleaning for visitors. In addition, our care manager will reinforce hand washing procedures and sanitizing of critical areas for all frontline staff. We have also built up a stock of necessary items if things get worse.

- **Building work** I apologise about the ongoing noise from the building work but it is unavoidable. Whilst the demolition aspect of the work is clearly the worst for noise, there will be ongoing banging and bashing for a while. I am grateful for and wish to publicly acknowledge the work and effort that Gladys and her kitchen staff have put in to maintain their flow of food for residents and fellow staff alike.
